
Kelly Cup Mark Butterworth raced to the award, driving his 1938 V12 Lagonda at the Oulton Park Gold Cup meeting.


Layshaft Award Peter Murphy suffered his success via a crushed front wing, courtesy of an unknown assailant in a car park.

Adrian and Dot take their own Morgan 'Tour de France' in September 2019.



In 2019 a group of us cycled from the Channel to the Med, covering around 850 miles from Caen to Nice in 14 days, flying home from sunny Nice. We included an ascent of the infamous Ventoux, so loved by the Tour de France riders who ascend it in 90 minutes or so, it took us 4 hours!, but enough of that...

...what struck us about the whole route was it's amazing variety using 'N' and 'D' roads we saw every aspect of rural France from the Apple Orchards of Normandy to the Vineyards of Provence riding over the Massif Central and up the Gorge de Verdon. So the idea was hatched to drive the route in the Morgan.

The route we thought was easy, just follow our cycling notes, but we were of course a lot faster so instead of averaging around 65 miles a day we went for two days in one so half the overnight stops. Actually driving over 100 miles on 'D' roads is surprisingly hard work, at times the roads were so bumpy we were driving at cycling speed! As a result we resorted to bypass routes on better roads especially when the cycle route went off down a cycle track!

Upon catching the overnight ferry from Portsmouth to Caen we arrived early in Ouistreham (Caen port). A good start soon had us confused with the roads around Caen, taking some two hours to get south! After a brief domestic we were soon back on track, enjoying the countryside having lunch in Bagnoles de l'Orne and an overnight stop in La Flèche in the region known as 'Pays de la Loire'.

After a good nights sleep we set off along the banks of the Loire past Chateaux through Loches and onto Crozant passing thorough the beautiful village of Gargilesse-Dempierre with steeply roofed houses and a Romanesque church and castle.

The following morning saw us heading towards Le Mont Dore via Aubusson through the Limousin region

best known for its red muscle-bound beef cattle! and on past Rémy Martin (vsop fame). We passed through Fresselines where Monet produced much of his work.

Le Mont-Dore at the source of the Dourdogne River is both a summer activities centre and a ski resort in winter. The owner of our Hotel loved the Morgan, taking pictures galore. In the morning we walked the town market before setting off for Mende, As yesterday we continued out over the Massif Central starting with a big climb out of the town, horse power definitely better than peddle we can tell you!

We passed through St Flour driving through the Languedoc Roussillon wine region feeling very much that we were getting into the south of France. Mende is in the upper Lot Valley, a small city of about 12,000 citizens. Dating back to the 3rd century it is full of medieval buildings, Interestingly the Tower of the Cathedral once contained the largest bell in the world until it was melted down in the 16th century to make cannons!.

We spent the night in a lovely apartment developed from a 17th century terrace from where we continued on to Vaison-La-Romaine and Ventoux. We travelled via the Vallon Pont d'Arc on the Ardèche river, a beautiful natural limestone arch spanning the river in an area known as the Rhone Alps.

You cannot mention the Ardèche without mentioning chestnuts for which the area is famous for producing 'marron glacé' (candied chestnut). Beaujolais and Cotes de Rhone come from this area and there is a cave with paintings and engravings said to be 36,000 years old, not open to the public for preservation reasons!

Vaison-la Romaine lies between the Alps and the Mediterranean and is at the foot of Ventoux, so after a good nights rest and super breakfast overlooking the river we headed off up the mountain to relive my excruciating 4 hours climb of 3 years earlier, it took us 45 minutes in the Morgan, this iconic Tour de France climb has a cycling record of 55m 51s set up by a Frenchman in 2004, how he did it we don't know. Most professionals can do it in under 2 hours. It's well worth the effort though, as the panorama from the summit is stunning with 360 degree views over the maritime alps and the wine growing areas of Provence.

From Ventoux we headed south to Moustiers Sainte Marie, famously the most beautiful village in France situated in Haute Provence and lives up to its reputation in spades, absolutely delightful, driving through the narrow main street with the hood down was a real head turner. We stayed here for two nights which was a good break taking in the atmosphere, good food, countryside walks and the cafes were wonderful.

From here it was only 60 miles to Nice, traveling across the Gorge de Verdon and along through the hills and roads of the Alp Maritime with a sweeping descent into Nice and our Hotel on the Promenade des Anglais. We stayed there for three nights before the long drive home.

After a relaxing couple of days we headed north via Lyon, Tours, Le Mans a drive of over 800 miles, sadly this was all on motorways staying two nights on the way with a final night to Bayeux giving us time to see the Cathedral and Tapestry before catching the ferry home from Caen. It was a wonderful trip, with the Morgan performing faultlessly throughout, after its longest trip ever at just over 2,000 miles, including driving to the south coast. Apart from England and Northern France it was hood down driving all the way, with the weather finally breaking as we hit Normandy at the end of the first week of October


